



INTRODUCTION

VanDusen Botanical Garden and Bloedel Conservatory are jointly operated by the Vancouver Botanical Gardens Association (VBGA) and the City of Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation. Both organisations share responsibility for the day to day running of the Gardens. This close and long-standing relationship is best represented in what we all get to see every day at both locations.

The work VBGA does together with the Park Board is defined by the roles and responsibilities in our joint operating agreement, most recently updated in 1994. Both VBGA and Park Board recognize a great deal has changed in the last almost 30 years. For the past number of years we have been working with Park Board towards the creation of a new Joint Operating Agreement to be approved by elected Park Board officials and VBGA Board, ideally culminating in ratification within the next few months.

LETTER FROM VBGA PRESIDENT



As my second and final year as VBGA President concludes, I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your continued support of VBGA during a period of unprecedented challenges and provide an update of our current status.

As we appear to be finally emerging from the turmoil of the pandemic, I am very pleased to report that VBGA has not only survived, but we are finding ourselves in a much better financial position than previously anticipated as we prepare to move forward into a more normalized future.

Though losses were originally forecast for 2021, VBGA's overall business operations concluded on a positive note with a net positive balance of \$981,683. This happy outcome was achieved due to a combination of government assistance, better than expected attendance in our education programs, our thriving membership, and the receipt of some significant donations.

Numbers of note include a 22% rise in membership, representing an increase from 10,400 adult memberships in 2020 to 12,686 in 2021. We filled 1,493 camp spots, tripling our spaces available in 2020 and nearly doubling the spaces available in pre-pandemic 2019. Having children in the Garden during the summer months was wonderful to see. In addition to promoting an appreciation for gardens and sustainability, the camps provided much needed respite and stimulation for children whose lives have been so impacted by the pandemic.

None of these outcomes would have been possible without the very substantial efforts of our management team led by Executive Director Stephen Shapiro. Their hard work resulted in successful adaptation of our operations to meet health restrictions, significantly enhanced access to the Gardens, critical financial support, and improved facilitation of volunteer activities to the extent possible. I would also like to recognize the exceptional contribution of our Treasurer and Finance Committee Chair, Christine McCaffrey, who committed countless volunteer hours and expertise to ensuring we had access to government funding, and continued to meet our financial obligations as we made our way through the pandemic.

The VBGA recognizes, and was sorry to have been forced to put on hold many of our volunteer activities during the pandemic. Management, with the support of the Board, is continuing to work hard to re-establish those roles as quickly as possible. Our sizeable volunteer team is extremely important to VBGA and we look forward to welcoming you all back. To recognize our wonderful volunteers and celebrate National Volunteer Week (April 24th – 30th) we lit Bloedel Conservatory in green, hosted educational walks, held a photo contest, and offered exclusive access to Bloedel Conservatory and VanDusen Botanical Garden for volunteers to connect and explore.

In addition to seeing our way through the economic hurdles of the last two years, VBGA worked cooperatively with Vancouver Park Board to generate and ratify a new Strategic Plan for VanDusen Botanical Garden and Bloedel Conservatory in October 2021. The Strategic Plan document articulates key Values and defines the Vision, Mission and several Transformative Goals for VanDusen Botanical Garden and Bloedel Conservatory. It is consistent with VBGA's own Vision and Mission and is a significant milestone on the road to a new Joint Operating Agreement with Park Board.

The final push in the JOA negotiations is currently well underway and represents a major and ongoing task which we commenced several years ago. The Board has been very engaged in this process and we are finally moving ahead at a better pace. VBGA JOA Committees have identified key areas we would like to sustain and those we would like to improve, and have set the groundwork for negotiating a mutually rewarding agreement with Park Board. We are hopeful this can occur within the next few months.

In addition to managing the economics of the pandemic, and the diligent work on the JOA, VBGA Board members have been active in a variety of areas such as revisiting our role in stewardship and sustainability and examining the potential for a new groundwater supply system at VanDusen. Board members have also developed and updated many important governance policies and IT management systems, managed capital budgets and investment policies, managed recruitment and succession planning and sought significant new opportunities for garden and facility development.

All these activities have been undertaken by our volunteer Board over the last two years and with significant good will and dedication. I am very grateful for their contribution, as well as the strong support from staff, particularly VBGA Executive Director Stephen Shapiro. I also want to particularly acknowledge and thank our wonderful members, volunteers, donors and supporters without whom the organization could not have survived.

In addition to this being the conclusion of my term as President, I have completed 3 x three year terms as a Board member and will be retiring from the Board at this time. I want to extend my sincere appreciation to all those I have had the opportunity to work alongside and get to know this past nine years – it has been my sincere pleasure to work with each and every one of you.

VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT

In 2021, the Volunteer Engagement team focused on keeping our volunteer community connected. Volunteers stayed engaged through virtual study groups, weekly garden stories, virtual seed cleaning sessions, online team meetings, personal phone calls, and more. The strength of the VBGA volunteer community was highlighted during our 2021 online annual Volunteer Recognition Event, where fellow volunteers celebrated all those who both formally and informally kept the volunteer community connected.

When it was safe to do so, we welcomed back volunteer teams in a modified fashion to serve the Gardens:

- Guides provided walking tours through the Garden to inspire and educate visitors and members.
- Adult Education hosts provided virtual support for education class participants.
- Seed Collectors collected, cleaned, and sold Garden seeds.
- Fresh Flower Arrangers created beautiful displays in the atrium.
- Preschool Storytime volunteers read with families in the outdoor classroom courtyard.
- Bird Walk Guides shared their birding expertise and passion with Garden visitors.
- Library volunteers worked behind the scenes to assist with cataloguing.
- Administrative and program support volunteers assisted the Membership, Youth Education, and Volunteer Engagement departments.
- Plant Inventory volunteers supported plant documentation.
- Photography volunteers documented our plant collections and helped tell the story of our education programs, through images.
- Today in the Garden volunteers displayed and updated what was in bloom throughout the year.

We look forward to welcoming back School Program Leaders, Docents, Plant Sale, Member and Visitor Service, and Camp volunteers when it is safe to do so, and we very much miss your support and presence at the Garden and Conservatory.

We continue to adapt and evolve, rethinking how to best support the wonderful VBGA volunteer community. In 2021, we developed online educational opportunities such as Indigenous Knowledge training covering land acknowledgments, re-evaluating the history of the Gardens, terminology, the Medicine Wheel and more. Our new Volunteer Emeritus program celebrates longstanding, retired volunteers who wish to stay connected to the Gardens by welcoming them to join select volunteer events. The In Honour and In Memoriam Volunteer Initiative recognizes individuals during our annual volunteer recognition event and in the Volunteer Buzz e-newsletter.

Volunteers, thank you for your continued support, patience, and adaptability during this challenging time. Your time and talent bring our Gardens to life, connecting our visitors, members, and participants to plants and the importance of biodiversity to our lives. We look forward to safely continuing in 2022 and seeing you in the Gardens.

MEMBERSHIP HIGHLIGHTS



This year once again highlighted the remarkable resilience of VBGA Members in an ever-changing landscape. The VBGA Membership Team worked to provide a safe, steady and supportive presence for Members at the Membership Desk in the Visitor Centre, and behind the scenes, our membership staff and volunteers worked diligently to provide consistent membership services.

Online reservations to visit the Garden were no longer required as of July 15th, 2021, and by the end of December, it was announced that Bloedel Conservatory would no longer require reservations starting January 2022. We sincerely appreciate Members' perseverance, patience and understanding while the online reservation system was in place.

Despite challenges, membership revenue has grown over the last twelve months from \$392,372 in 2020 to \$418,756 in 2021. The membership base grew to 12,686 adult members representing 8,779 households, an increase of 22% from 2020. Access to nature remains as important as ever for our renewing and new members.

There has been a noticeable shift in our membership demographic in 2021, with a growth of over 44% in family memberships. We are excited by this growth, representing 1,261 family memberships in 2021 compared with 873 in 2020. This is in part due to a member discount and priority registration for our kids' camps, which have attracted new families to purchase a VBGA Membership.

In 2021, membership sales climbed above pre-pandemic levels — a significant milestone for VBGA. We wish to extend a huge thank you to returning and new members for your overwhelming commitment to VBGA and the Gardens during

another challenging year. Membership revenue directly supports VBGA programs and services such as online and in-person education offerings and the monthly Garden Connection e-newsletter.

We were pleased Festival of Lights went ahead in 2021 with discounted admission tickets for VBGA Members. Members continued to share their love of the Gardens with others and there was a significant increase in Membership Gift Certificates sold. In 2021, there were 342 gift certificates sold compared to 181 in 2020, almost double the sales.

We thank you for your continued patronage, patience and contribution as we gratefully steward these sanctuaries for your continued enjoyment and learning.

VBGA EDUCATION Growing plant-based literacy

Throughout this difficult year, where many people experienced separation from loved ones and a disconnect from community, we were dedicated and determined to provide VBGA Members and community with dynamic programing. During the pandemic, many people developed a new-found passion for gardening and developed new hobbies such as sketching and painting with watercolours. We responded to that demand by significantly increasing our offerings in engaging online and in-person courses for adults and families. We provided much-needed childcare spaces and an outlet for elementary aged children to socialize in our camps. We welcomed 4,828 participants in our programs, nearly doubling the number of participants in 2020.

The Yosef Wosk Library & Resource Centre continued to serve as a welcoming space where visitors could connect safely, both in person and online. We welcomed 3,221 library visitors and had 688 participants in library programing. In addition to offering Speaker Series, Book Club, and Preschool Storytime programing, the Vancouver Plein Air art exhibition was maintained for the entirety of 2021. This exhibition featured the work of approximately 14 artists, and all of the featured works had been created on location at VanDusen Botanical Garden. We also undertook a full data migration, carefully planning and eventually fully transitioning to a new integrated library system that will better serve the library and its users.

Online Programing

As the VBGA adapted to Covid restrictions, the majority of our Adult Education courses were delivered online. 891 people participated in one or more of the 46 adult education programs offered in four priority themes: Gardening and Design, Botanical Arts, Botany and Ecology, and Plants and People. The most popular topics among our audiences were related to gardening and birds, tree identification skills, drawing, and watercolour classes. We have been very grateful for our community of amazing and skilled long-term educators and the new relationships we developed with instructors and organizations that allowed us to offer classes on invasive species, improving the quality of garden soil, and eco-printing on paper. The Bird Identification Certificate Program was presented online for the first time in collaboration with Vancouver Avian Research Centre, a course so successful that we are repeating it in 2022.

We offered 8 Speaker Series events over the year with a total of 427 attendees. Themes were diverse in nature, ranging from Race and Outdoor Space: Perception and Access to Nature, A Remarkable Ice Age Megaflood in Southwestern BC, and The Early Days of Botanical Gardens, and more.

We continued to offer professional development courses for teachers. To express our appreciation to teachers keeping children safe throughout the pandemic, we offered our popular 10-session monthly Classroom Gardener Series at no charge to 143 elementary teachers across the Lower Mainland. Facilitated by Megan Zeni, a local advocate and champion for schoolyard gardens and the importance of outdoor play in children's development, this year also included several special guests such as Amanda Adams from Growing Chefs and a BC gardening favorite, Linda Gilkenson. We also hosted 172 teachers in public and private workshops including, *The Importance of Indigenous Perspectives in Children's Environmental Inquiry* led by Natural Curiosity, and *Schoolyard Birds for Educators* with the Vancouver Avian Research Centre.

Our Book Club, which had made a smooth transition from in-person to online meetings as a result of the pandemic, met 6 times and engaged 131 participants in dynamic conversations about a range of books and topics.





Return to In-Person Programing

In September, we were thrilled to offer the return of in-person Garden programing. Seeing our participants joyfully connecting with plants in the Garden they love filled the classroom and Garden with hope and optimism. Our education team worked extensively on detailed Covid-19 safety plans and adhered to strict safety protocols. We welcomed guests on-site for adult education courses, field trips, preschool storytime, medicine wheel ceremonies and our very popular guided bird walks. The return of these free tours, led by long-time volunteer and birding enthusiast Jeremy Gordon, provided a safe opportunity for beginner and experienced birdwatchers to discover birding hotspots around the Garden.

Camps

Access to childcare and safe experiences for children to make social connections has been challenging for families. We responded to this demand by significantly increasing available spaces in our outdoor nature-based summer, spring break, pro-d and weekend camps. We filled 1,493 camp spots, tripling our spaces available in 2020 and nearly doubling the spaces available in pre-pandemic 2019. We offered 34 diverse and fun camp themes that include art, sustainability, ecology, conservation, and science.

Safety was our top priority, and we adhered to strict Covid-19 protocols that went above and beyond PHO orders to ensure all of our campers and their families were safe. We reserved Bloedel Conservatory for children in summer camps, who went on walking field trips where they enjoyed the space privately.

We also provided employment opportunities for youth to gain practical hands-on work experience. We welcomed Camp Leaders, Junior Counselors, a Canadian Heritage Educator, a Special Needs and Inclusion Leader, and Environmental Educators.

In 2021, the VBGA Fellowship (in partnership with SFU's Institute for Environmental Learning) focused on our camp programs. Through participatory action research the Fellows gathered data by observations, family and camp staff evaluations, and focus groups with families. The Fellows released their 2021 report and their main findings included:

- **1. A Garden for All:** The value and impact provided by the VBGA's educational programing extends beyond campers to their family, friends, and community.
- **2. Connecting People, Plants, and Community:** The Garden filled significant educational, social, and emotional gaps created by the pandemic in the community and world-wide.
- **3. Responsible Stewardship:** The training provided to the VBGA's camp staff is holistic in that it encourages children to explore and push creative boundaries while remaining respectful of all living things.
- **4. The Garden is Our Teacher:** The wisdom and knowledge provided by the Garden is a sacred thing to be held in reverence and respect. It is evident that the VBGA's efforts to instill in its learners both a love and appreciation for the natural world will have impacts extending beyond the Garden's walls.
- 5. Rooted for the Future Longevity Interconnectedness brings Responsibility
 and Stewardship: Programs and events that are designed
 and conducted from a core understanding and practice of
 interconnectedness bring forth a sense of responsibility
 and stewardship that stems from the Garden and goes
 beyond to traverse different environments.





